### Pastor's Pen

Living requires resiliency. None of us can predict what will happen today or tomorrow. James chides us a bit. "Come now, you who say, 'Today or tomorrow we will go to such and such a town and spend a year there, doing business and making money.' Yet you do not even know what tomorrow will bring. What is your life? For you are a mist that appears for a little while and then vanishes. Instead, you ought to say, 'If the Lord wishes, we will live and do this or that.'" (*James 4:13-15*)

Life has its way of humbling us when we become arrogant and self-assured enough to think we are in control. As we find ourselves three weeks into Lent what assurance we have is grounded in following Christ through repentance and entering into the promise of God's resurrection hope. It is God who sustains, carries, and guides us through the unknown tomorrows. The reformer Martin Luther observes that "A person never flies so high as when he or she knows not whether he or she is going". But God does. So, all through Lent Jesus says, "Follow me."

Our context of ministry is dynamic and unstable. A new culture is overwhelming us with change. Our identity as a church is in flux. There is a sense of loss and grief. We know who we were but who are we

becoming? What will we look like ten years from now? James Kouzes and Barry Posner describe how best we can negotiate these waters being navigated: "No one can accurately predict what will happen next. Those who are the most agile and flexible, those supple enough to adapt to shifting conditions, will succeed." (*Healthy Congregations*, p.36)

The only manual we have is that of trust and faith in the Christ who calls us to follow him. He tells us that change need not be a baffling event. We aren't victims. Finding blame or attacking others will undermine faith and be destructive to the community. Understand that the inability to break away from established ways of seeing things will limit our ability to see what new thing God is doing.

The Spirit of Christ calls us to view change as a manageable process with his wisdom and guidance. Our energy and ability to respond to the disruptions around us come through prayer, scripture reading, faith, and discernment by listening to the Holy Spirit together. God will grant us the capacity to go with the flow of uncertainty with a sense of humor, a willingness to learn with a belief that God working through us will impact outcomes. This is all very hopeful to me, not because of who I am or who you are, but because of who God is.

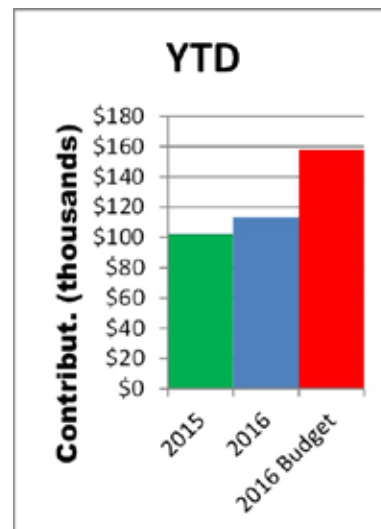
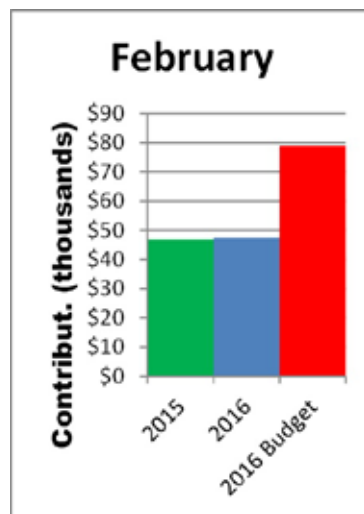

**Tax Season**

April 15 is rapidly approaching and while getting your 2015 returns in order, it is not too early to start thinking about 2016 tax planning and in particular deductions for charitable donations. Some policies, such as the ability to directly transfer Minimum Required Deductions from IRA accounts to charitable organizations, were recently made permanent (rather than being renewed at the last minute each year). February Contributions: Contributions for February were slightly higher than in February 2015. February is one of our weakest months for contributions and this year was no exception. Contributions were \$32,000 below the average budgeted monthly expenses and are now about \$44,000 below the YTD budgeted expenses.

Progress on Phase 1:

- Hatter's Organ Repair continues to make final adjustments, including valve-by-valve adjustments and finding and fixing air leaks.
- Rodgers Organ voicing expert Gerry Oehring has been contacted to put our church in his schedule and he is aware that we're near completion.
- MATCO continues fire sprinkler piping installation. The first floor piping, including Westminster Hall and Mae Chapin Parlor, is due to start around February 24, 2016.
- The carpenter, Wingle Construction, is beginning wood trim work at the sanctuary piping troughs and painting piping throughout both buildings.
- Regarding stained glass windows and frames restoration work, the committee believes competitive bids for the stained glass and wood frame repair should be solicited on the east and north sides of the church. Brush Architects will be asked to prepare this bid package.

## Relocation Ministry Team

Don and Valerie are new Americans. After living three months with her cousin they have worked and saved for a rent deposit, first month rent, electric deposit and they are more than ready to move with their three young children to a place of their own.

But the apartment is empty. Even at 800 square feet it is completely empty. No place but the floor on which to sleep, no place to sit and nothing with which to cook or serve food, no blanket or sheet, no towel and savings have been exhausted.

We request your prayers for this ministry. Our team of volunteers will move your things from your home and then deliver them to a most grateful family in your neighborhood. We accompany deliveries with a bible and information about our church. We accept tax deductible donations of household items to give to families beginning a new life in Champaign – Urbana and we accept financial donations to our restricted account.

We invite you to join others both young and old in the joy of this work. We need the support of folks with trucks and trailers, lifters and pushers. We need folks who can help with minor furniture repairs including scratch touch up and those who can shop garage and estate sales for useful things.

Your Relocation Team responds with mattresses, a dining table and chairs, some pots and pans, some plates and glasses, some sheets and blankets. This will be most welcome and appreciated until the family can buy the things they want. We serve people from our own congregation and those referred by the Refugee Center. Thanks to a generous donor we have an ample storage unit to support this work.

## Compassion, Peace and Justice

The Presbyterian Church’s commitment to justice is core to its identity and understanding as followers of Jesus Christ. Beginning with the ancient texts of the faith, God’s people have given both voice and witness to the prophet Micah’s calling to do justice, love kindness and walk humbly with God.

The Confessions of the church, especially the *Confession of 1967* and *A Brief Statement of Faith*, challenge the church to follow Christ into a broken and fearful world to:

- pray without ceasing,
- to witness among all peoples
- to Christ as Lord and Savior,
- to unmask idolatries in church and culture,
- to hear the voices of peoples long silenced,
- and to work with others for justice, freedom and peace.

— *A Brief Statement of Faith* 10.4

The *Book of Order* also makes it clear that the whole church gathers in worship and its corporate life for the purpose of being sent out into the world to engage in the reconciling, healing work of God through Jesus Christ. God sends the church in the power of the Holy Spirit to share with Christ in establishing God’s just, peaceable and loving rule in the world. (W-7.4000)<sup>1</sup>

## World Missions Ministry

FPCC Dominican Republic Education  
Project

- Schools for poor children in the DR are being supported by FPCC from the mission portion of the Forward 150 funds in a three year project.
- FPCC is partnering with Opportunity International, the oldest and largest Christian microfinance organization in the world, to provide loans to the owners of private schools dedicated to the quality education of poor children.
- In addition, Opportunity International provides school fee loans to parents who could not otherwise afford to send their children to school.
- Loans are used by school proprietors (teacher-owners) for a variety of reasons including: constructing and improving infrastructure including new classrooms, computer labs, libraries and toilet and sanitation facilities. They are also using loans to purchase books teaching materials, computers, etc.
- Since 2012, 194 developing schools in the DR have received loans (cumulative average being \$3,579.00 per school). Loans are typically repaid within 18-24 months.

The Big Picture View of World Poverty and Education. According to Opportunity International, Currently, at least 100 million children worldwide (over 70% girls!) are not enrolled in schools, mostly because quality education is not available and/or families cannot afford the cost. **and**, education (or the lack thereof!) is the SINGLE LARGEST DETERMINANT for future economic status.

The World Mission Team will continue to keep you informed about this exciting ministry.

In her work she serves low income new Americans needing legal help with the immigration system.

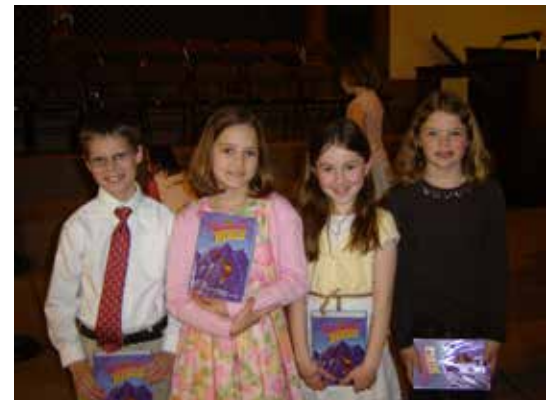
