One Step at a Time

Sweaty palms, pounding heart, shaking hands. What am I doing up here alone? I can't get this plane on the ground. Yes, you can. You've been working five months for this moment. Solo! You've done a hundred landings. This one is no different. Calm down. You can do it. One step at a time. Decrease power, add flaps, say a little prayer, easy does it. Touch down. You did it! Is there any greater feeling than that first solo flight?

Why did it all begin? What is a 48 year old woman, whose life has been consumed with Girl Scouts, PTA, Junior League and Sunday School teaching, doing learning to fly a plane? Could it be reaching out - growing - one step at a time? It all began with a spontaneous reply to my husband's 100th announcement that he sure would like to learn to fly. I was tired of hearing it and said, "You get out there and I'll learn with you." We started together. He took two hours and quit - too many business commitments (however, at age 60, he got his license.) I had the unique distinction of going through four years of college and never taking a course in math or science (the Journalism School did not require it). Now I found that learning to fly is 40% math, 40% science and 20% panic. I took the ground school at the local Junior College and found myself the only woman with 20 young men in the class. However, if I could drive a car, surely flying an airplane is not that different. Wrong...everything about flying was terribly confusing. Steer with your feet? How can you control so many types of movement at once? After 80 hours of instruction, I took the flight test and failed - a strong cross wind on landing forced the flight examiner to take over. Back to the drawing board and more instruction. Another ten hours and the certificate was mine. The challenge of mastering this art led me to get the instrument rating and commercial pilot's license. Thea Rasche, an early woman pilot said, "Flying is more exciting than love of a man and less dangerous." I was hooked. It was great that my husband and I could fly on vacations and visit our children at their colleges and homes. However, I felt this was a special skill that should be used to help others.

It occurred to me that many people need to travel for medical treatment or diagnosis and have no way get there. I put an article in the Illinois Aviation newsletter inviting anyone interested in starting a new project to meet and discuss it. Forty pilots responded and **Lifeline Pilots** was formed. **This free air service** would make it possible for people to receive emergency medical help, such as organ transplants and other medical needs when other options are not available. The first year, eight missions were flown. **In the 33 years of operation, over 8,000 missions have been flown.** The early criteria of emergency need was expanded to any medical or humanitarian need. Over 1,000 pilots have participated. The pilots cover all of the expenses themselves. The area covered has expanded from the state of Illinois to much of the country. Many individual cases come to mind. The mother of a two-year-old boy from Windsor, Canada, was told he had no hamstrings and would never walk. She met a pilot in Detroit who flew that child to Children's Hospital in Chicago for a five-day treatment every week. After a year of treatment, he took his first step and will lead a normal life. A teenager in Peoria, Illinois was suffering from kidney failure and other organ problems. The doctors had done all they could and gave him less than a year to live. They noted that Mayo Clinic might be able to help. There, he was told he would need to come in three times a week for treatment. The family could not handle that, so Lifeline Pilots flew him there for 90 treatments. He is completely cured now and looking forward to being a pilot. Recently, a high school senior was being treated for a malignant brain tumor at St. Jude Children's Research Hospital in Memphis, TN. His class voted him homecoming king, but his doctor said making that trip by car would not be possible in his condition. Lifeline Pilots flew him home for the festivities and immediately back to St. Jude. There is no doubt than many people are still alive today because of the service Lifeline Pilots provided. One of my personal missions will always remain in my mind. I was flying a four year old boy to another state for treatment when the air controller asked me "Who is singing Old MacDonald Had a Farm?"

The World Mission Fund donates to Lifeline Pilots regularly. What an amazing ministry Lifeline Pilots is!

Lifeline Pilots has been actively involved in disaster relief. When the twin towers were hit in New York, all but military aircraft was grounded. Lifeline was permitted to fly skin tissue for the Red Cross for burn victims that night. The pilots have assisted in tornado and hurricane disasters by flying supplies and personnel to the areas needing help. A recent example is the trips made to assist victims of Hurricane Sandy in the East. In 1990, all of the groups around the country involved in public flying met at the Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association headquarters in Maryland and formed an alliance to share information and find ways to work together. Air Care Alliance enables these groups to link together to transport people longer distances.

The first ten years were challenging. A Board of Directors was formed to establish criteria for use and operational standards.

Pilots were recruited to fly and medical centers and other user groups informed of the service. My job was to put the recipients and pilots together. My technical tools were a phone and typewriter. After ten years, it was obvious that the project had grown to the extent that a full time mission coordinator was needed. Subsequently, an office was opened in Peoria, Illinois at the airport and a three person staff runs the operation. A thirteen member Board of Directors sets policy and oversees the annual budget of \$200,000. Many changes

have occurred in the past 33 years. Communication is now by cell phone, email and computer websites. What has not changed is the need for medical diagnosis and treatment. Many times insurance will cover the medical treatment but not the transportation. Traveling long distances to a medical center can be very difficult by car. Recipients must be able to enter a small aircraft with little or no assistance and sit up with a seat belt. The service is not air ambulance but more like a taxi service.

How defining was that moment of my first solo flight? It changed my life. I have met some wonderful people and found great satisfaction in reaching out to help others. As we are confronted with continuous news of violence, corruption and hatred it is heart warming to know of the compassion and generosity of so many people. A man once turned to God and said, "There is so much pain and suffering in the world, why don't you do something about it?" God answered, "I did. I sent you."

A Letter from Bob and Kristi Rice, Mission Co-Workers in the Congo September 23, 2015

Greetings in the name of Jesus Christ! We want to express how grateful we are for your participation in our ministry here in Congo. Your prayers and sacrificial financial gifts enable us to stand with our partner ministry, the Congolese Presbyterian Community (CPC).

We are doing well. We have just entered the long rain season in Congo. We anticipate being in the US next year (2016), itinerating and visiting churches from July until December. If you would like for us to visit your church, please let us know.

We want to share just a few of our current activities and prayer requests:

- In late May/early June, Kristi and Elder Victorine Manga, a Congolese colleague, were able to attend a training in Togo on savings groups. Just this week we are training the second savings group near Kananga; the first group has already saved almost \$100 in four weeks and three members have been able to take out a loan. Our hope and prayer is that these groups will spread throughout both Kasai provinces to give a lift up to those stuck in physical poverty.
- Bob and two colleagues, Pastor Mboyamba and Elder Kalambayi, attended the three week International School of Reconciliation in Rwanda in July; we learned a significant biblical approach to help Christian leaders receive inner healing, to forgive and repent, and to be reconciled to one another; in August we conducted a seminar with these teachings and saw amazing fruit! We plan to conduct another seminar on healing and reconciliation in November. We ask prayer for discernment concerning how these teachings and seminars can bring peace and reconciliation here in Congo.
- The Ditekemena program for street children is going well; the new school year has just started and all 23 school age children are either in normal schools or a catch-up school which has been initiated by this program; we hope and pray that 10 children can return to homes in the next 2-3 months.
- The Bible subsidy program continues to roll along, helping people access Bibles, songbooks, and children's Bibles.

Again, we are grateful for your participation and support of God's ministry in Congo. We trust that you have been receiving our newsletters, posted on our PC(USA) web-page. If there is anyone you would like to add to receive these updates, please let us know. Please know that we pray for you each week.


Organizing a Mission Event? Please Use the Updated Orange Form...


