Snippets from Your Pastor A Murder in the Neighborhood

In the 1930's Martin Niemollor was a Lutheran pastor of a wealthy Berlin suburb. He supported the Nazis until the early 1930's when the government, more and more, meddled in the affairs of the church. At the end of the war after his release from seven years in concentration camps, he wrote this poem:

When the Nazis came for the communists, I remained silent; I was not a communist.

When they locked up the social democrats, I remained silent: I was not a social democrat.

When they came for the trade unionists, I did not speak out; I was not a trade unionist.

When they came for the Jews, I did not speak out; I was not a Jew.

When they came for me, there was no one left to speak out.

Who in our culture has no one to speak up for them? Who are we-First Presbyterian Church-not speaking up for? How are we being a good neighbor with all our neighbors?

I've been thinking about that a lot this week.

On Tuesday evening, October 30, our church's Cuba study group sat together lamenting the terrible assassinations of Jewish brothers and sisters as they worship in Pittsburgh. We sat around our breakfast table and said the sorts of things you've said at times like that. We were truly sorry. We felt helpless. All of our solutions-to me, anyway-felt inadequate to stem the tide of random acts of vicious violence.

We agreed language matters, and hate language at all levels of society needs immediately to be challenged for what it is. We agreed our increasing lack of continued on next page

civility in this country (and perhaps around the world) contribute directly to emboldening people to wreak havoc not only with their words, but, with increasingly frequent deadliness. We could have talked about race, about power differentials, about gun control and gun culture, about fear mongers, about better help for the mentally ill. We could have talked all night.

Coulda, shoulda, woulda.

We were impotent armchair quarterbacks whimpering from the sidelines for world peace, justice for all, and brotherly and sisterly love. Wringing our hands. Feeling outraged. Feeling defeated. Looking at our feet. Ain't it awful. Can't we just get along?

Lord, have mercy.

Somebody mentioned the murders in our own community. What do we do about them? The ones in our own back yard? Somebody said, next time there's a murder in our town, we should gather to pray. We should gather to pray at the site of where the murder occurred, someone else said. This, at the time, seemed another weak, incomplete response to murder, but it seemed better than doing nothing. It seemed a legitimate and constructive way to channel our collective outrage. Christians gathering to pray is never a bad idea.

Our conversation shifted from Pittsburgh and Champaign County to Cuba, our reason for gathering that night. We've been gathering each week to learn about Cuba because we plan on traveling there in February. We're trying to help build relations with that culture through our long-time partnership with the Luyano Presbyterian Church in Havana. We had our usual good meeting.

By the time we were driving home, Dondre Moore had been shot on the 400 block of West Vine. By the time we turned on the evening news, Dondre Moore was dead.

How is First Presbyterian Church being a good neighbor?

Pastor Niemoller may have been a perfectly "polite" neighbor in his comfortable Berlin suburb, but by his own admission he wasn't a very good neighbor to the whole neighborhood. And when he needed a good neighbor, a really good neighbor, a neighbor willing to speak up for him, it's no surprise he didn't have one. None were left.

As a newcomer to our church, I look around and think we are doing a pretty good job of being a good neighbor. Examples abound.

Our World Mission Team attempts to keep us connected with neighbors around the world. First Presbyterian Church is deepening relationships with mission co-workers and ministry partners in Indonesia, Central Africa, Cuba, and Pakistan. Our Pakistan travel group leaves November 8th to visit the girls' school in Sangla Hill; that country has only recently been awash in unrest thanks to a recent court decision. Our Cuba travel group leaves in February to stay with friends in our partner church in Havana.

Locally, our Community Mission Deacons keep us helpfully connected with local mission partners—to S.A.F.E. House, Salt & Light, and feeding, immigration, and sheltering ministries all over town.

Our campus houses important mission initiatives. DREAAM House offices are here. The nurturing ministry of Young Lives happens here. AA meets here. We run an ESL program here.

And that's not a full list. We are attempting to be good stewards of both our natural environment and our human relationships, paying particular attention to the least of these.

Being a good neighbor, of course, is an essential calling of the church. For Martin Niemoller that meant being in authentic relationship with the communists, the social democrats, the trade unionists, and the Jews. Each of these groups of people were precisely the people who were outside of his comfort zone. These were people he either disagreed with, didn't like, or didn't care to notice.

But notice we must. We are called to stand with international and community mission partners, with local merchants, teachers, police, non-profits, sister houses of worship, and with those who live right next door.

On the afternoon of Halloween, five of us from our church walked door-to-door handing out white roses to our neighbors in the 400 block of West Vine. We wanted them to know that we noticed the news that went down the night before on their street. We noticed, and we were outraged, and broken, and prayerful, and reaching out.

I believe these neighbors need us. And as importantly, if not more so, we need them.

The "answer" to the problems in the world is Jesus. Any Christian would agree. To broaden that, the answer is love. To make it more concrete, the answer is being a good neighbor. Know your neighbor. Talk to your neighbor. Eat with your neighbor. Pray for your neighbor. And however you do it, be a good neighbor.

Mother Teresa's voice comes to my mind. Never be satisfied with your circle of good friends, but widen the circle. It's not just your next door neighbor that matters, but it is the neighbor down the street and the neighbor across the ocean.

Be a good neighbor.

And for the record let me announce what I hope to do next time there's a murder in our area. I'll gather with you the next day before nightfall around our church van. Well pray. I'll call the police, as I did last week, and tell them where we are going. We'll drive to the site of the crime. There, we'll pray. Then we'll play it by ear. We'll be open to the Spirit's nudging. Perhaps we'll walk around the block, up and down the street. We'll knock on doors and pass out white roses. We'll introduce ourselves. We won't talk politics. We won't pass around petitions. We won't stir the pot or crank up the heat. We'll just listen. We'll tell them that First Presbyterian Church

isn't that far away. We'll tell them we stand ready to welcome and serve. We'll thank them for being our neighbor.

Before the sun goes down the next day, we'll bear to them Christ's promise. None of us is alone. And nothing can separate us from God's love. Nothing.

This seems a small, ineffectual thing to do in the face of such life-ending violence. But small things matter. And two voices are better than one.

Matt Matthew's Charge to Associate Pastor Eric Corbin

Eric, I charge you with these words . . .

***Focus:** Keep your eyes on Jesus. The story of Peter walking on water serves as an example (Matthew 14:22ff): The disciples are on a boat battered by waves. Jesus appears to them, standing on the water. Peter says, 'Wow, I'd like to try walking on water, too.' Jesus invites him to try, and while he's coming toward Jesus he succeeds at walking on water. As soon as he loses focus, he sinks. Keep your eyes (and heart) on Jesus and you won't sink.

***Pray:** From an easy-to-miss verse in the first chapter of Mark (1:35). "In the morning, while it was still very dark, (Jesus) got up and went out to a deserted place, and there he prayed." Prior to these words, Jesus is busy. And during this time of prayer, Simon and his companions 'hunted' for Jesus because there was much to do. There will always be something else to do and you will never 'finish' your work. Turn off the busyness, however, and find time for prayer.

***Rejoice!** For heaven's sake, don't forget to have fun, to enjoy your ministry. Paul stresses this to the church at Philippi twice (4:4): "Rejoice in the Lord always, again I will say, rejoice." *Finally, these words from my minister when he charged me as a candidate on the floor of the old Norfolk Presbytery (Rev. Dr. Louie V. Andrews, Jr., April 28, 1987):

- Do not be afraid of or overcome by what some will call failure.
- Do not be awed or over-elated by what some will call success.
- Do not feel that you have fully succeeded or fully accomplished a task, for then you will stop seeking to be taught and to learn.
- Do not be ashamed to stand against the majority if you feel your cause is right ...but do not condemn those who disagree with you. Be willing to listen, to learn, to seek out the knowledge and the wisdom of others, but to always return to your personal relationship with God for the decision upon which you act and the cause for which you strive.
- Do not avoid the attribute of patience when dealing with others, but also do not shun the attribute of anger when the cause is just.
- Walk close to God, and what the world calls failures just might be glorious moments of fulfillment.

Financial Update

Contributions

Contributions in October were \$14K less than in 2017 and \$12K below the budget at \$59K. The Year to Date total is above last year by \$2K but below the budgeted amount by \$9K. These figures include prepaid pledges (those paid in the year prior to the budget year) that are prorated over the year with 1/12 added to each month's contributions. Including all prepaid pledges, at 83.3% through the year we have received 83.6% of the expected 2018 revenue.

Expenses

Year to Date expenses are \$12K below the budget at \$838K and more than in 2017 by \$32K. Considering all sources, expenses exceed revenue by \$17K which is \$24K more than at the end of October in 2017. At 83.3% through the year we have experienced 82.1% of the expected 2018 expenses.
