Snippets from your Pastor/Matt Matthews

The first congregation that called me "pastor" was located downtown in the river town of Dardanelle, Arkansas. People came downtown to get their mail. Their kids would play baseball at the park along the river. Farmers brought trucks of grain to the elevators across the river where it was eventually loaded onto barges and taken to Little Rock, and other the ports down the Mississippi.

Above town, five miles to the west, was a mountain that sat like a shoe box on the flat floor of farms and grasslands that made up the Arkansas River Valley. They called the mountain Mount Nebo. Look it up on a map. It's beautiful there. On a clear day you could see for miles. You could see Lake Dardanelle and the Arkansas River. You could see Dardanelle and Russellville. You could see the distant lights of Pottsville, London, Clarksville, Conway. You could watch storms approach, night fall, moonrise.

I'd bring friends up the mountain and we'd hike the Rim Trail. When we got to Sunrise Point and looked east, I'd point down and say, "There's the promised land." I was pointing downtown, to my house, our church, the post office, City Hall.

It was—for me—a promised land because that land is where the people I loved lived. Carl Jaggers' pharmacy and the post office were on main Street. And while milk and honey didn't flow in that land, you could get both local milk and local honey at the IGA; Melba Warren, in fact, would spread honey on the peanut butter and jelly she'd make you at the back counter at Warren Grocery on Main street. Larry Ragsdale spent all of his days and some of his nights farming the Carden Bottom down by the River. Jimmy raised hogs down the highway. The Sisson boys hunted those woods. Lee set up his easel to paint: the quail, the barns, rusted cars, fields, the deer. Page and Juana and many others taught in the public schools. AnnieLaura studied birds at the Holla Bend National Wildlife Refuge only a few miles from where hang gliders would launch themselves off of Sunrise point, drop below the ridge, then be lifted on warm thermal winds up into the sun.

When I stood on Mt. Nebo, I'd look down and I could see the faces of saints: my friends, parishioners, neighbors.

Irene took care of her husband while dying, herself, of pancreatic cancer. Lloyd, didn't speak much, but he spoke up when somebody brave needed to speak up. Larry tried honestly to be everybody's friend. Evelyn could be mean as a snake

but she made sure everybody in the public schools had good shoes on their feet and warm enough coats for the winter. Les took care of his wife long, so long, after she had forgotten his name. Judy delivered meals on wheels to old folk who long before had helped raise her.

It was quite a view from up on Mt. Nebo, looking down into that promised land, imagining all the faces of all the faithful people who taught me how to be a pastor.

I imagine that you could stand on your own Mount Nebo and tell me about the people who have nurtured, challenged, and loved you. You could close your eyes and tell me about the people you love. You could tell me about your late, beloved sister. You could tell me stories about your grandparents, and great grandparents, about how your family tree twines with the lives and the heartbeats of other families. You could tell me about the hopes and dreams you have for your kids and grandkids, and your students, and your friends.

You've seen the promised land, also.

I think this is what the Psalmist meant when she proclaimed, "Lord, you have been our dwelling place in all generations." We are children of God, created in God's image. We are brothers and sisters, friends and kin, putting down roots, hauling in crops, making a life in a place we call home, a home God provides, in a place God blesses.

Indeed, "Lord, you have been our dwelling place in all generations."

Financial Update

Finance Report

Contributions

Contributions in March were \$33K more than in 2018 and \$28K above the budget at \$104K. The Year to Date total is below last year by \$8K and below the budgeted amount by \$7K. These figures include prepaid pledges (those paid in the year prior to the budget year) that are prorated over the year with 1/12 added to each month's contributions. Including all revenue sources, at 25% through the year, we have received 29.8% of the expected 2019 revenue.

Expenses

Year to Date expenses are \$8K above the budget at \$274K but less than in 2018 by \$3K. Considering all sources, revenue exceeds expenses by \$33K which is \$52K less than at the end of March in 2018. This figure includes \$32K less in prepaid pledges than in 2018. At 25% through the year we have experienced 25.8 % of the expected 2019 expenses.

Dinara's Presentation

At the First Pres ESL Program, we try to foster a student-centered learning environment, which includes reciprocal learning between the students and volunteer teachers. Students are encouraged to teach everyone in the program about their culture whether through conversation, bringing in food to share, or giving a presentation about their home country.

This is exactly what Dinara, a student from Kazakhstan did on March 14. She talked about the geography of Kazakhstan, which made everyone in the audience want to visit the country because it is absolutely breathtaking. She told us about Kazakh culture, history, and famous people. In the past, Kazakhs were nomadic people who lived in yurts. "Kazakh" means "free" or "freedom-loving" and "stan" means "country" or "land". So, "Kazakhstan" means "free land" or "freedom-loving land". Dinara also told us about Nauryz, the Kazakh New Year. It means "new day" and is celebrated starting on March 21st for several days. Finally, Dinara also brought a traditional



Kazakh dish, bread filled with beef and onions, to share with the ESL Program. We really enjoy it when students teach us about their cultures.

The mission programs of the church are all funded by outside donors. Our partnership is shared with Covenant Presbyterian Church in Austin TX with whom we partner each July in assisting with Vacation Bible School in Cuba.
