F150 Update

Two and a half years ago we embarked on a journey together on a major capital drive. The Forward 150 initiative included major upgrades to our buildings, technology and organ along with funding for mission. We are now begining the third year of implementing these items. The following is a report from the Forward 150 Faithful detailing the progress made to date and work scheduled to take place this year.

- 1. A Clerk of the Works was employed by the church to assist in the administration of the construction Projects for Phase I.
- 2. An entirely new Information Technology System has been designed and installed throughout the Church and the Christian Education Building, including Audio and Visual technology in both buildings. The monitors can been seen in numerous locations and our service is broadcast throughout.
- 3. New digital organ/console with restored pipes for a completely new combination sound.
- 4. The Church joins the Christian Education Building as a fully sprinkled building. This is a project that the Church has been planning for 20 years and now both of our structures are protected. Both buildings have fire alarm systems that act as early detection and warning systems to alert the congregation to fire and the sprinkler system is intended to extinguish fire.
- 5. The infiltration of rainwater and back flowing of storm water into the lower level has been stopped with the installation of backflow prevention and sump pumps.
- 6. The Café renovation on the second floor of the Christian Education Building has been completed.
- 7. The Church purchased a new two door refrigerator.
- 8. A hearing loop was installed in the Sanctuary to assist

When I Was a Stranger, You Took Me In...

These words of Jesus were on my mind Monday morning as I prepared to teach a classroom full of sad, scared and confused students personally affected by the Executive Order to halt the refugee program and ban (at least temporarily) people with visas from entering the US. All of the ESL students are visitor visa or green card holders. Just last week, we enrolled students from Iran and Yemen—two countries placed on the seven nations banned list. One student and her husband, who is a researcher at the U of I, traveled back to Iran for the holiday break. Her husband returned to C-U to begin teaching two weeks ago; she was scheduled to return this week. Now she doesn't know when or if she will be allowed to return to live with him. We all share in her sorrow. And the heartbreaking situations of others in our program.

In the midst of the uncertainty, I began receiving calls and emails from people in the community who had heard about our program and just wanted to help. Many wanted to do something so that our immigrants would know they are welcome here. A young woman, who has never visited the ESL program or our church wrote on Facebook that she was "feeling helpless and wanted to do something," so she set up a gofundme. com campaign and called it "ESL is my Valentine"! When I shared this news with the students, many of them cried. These stories and the small acts of generosity are symbols to them that they are welcome and loved here. The outpouring of love from strangers to strangers demonstrates what it looks like to take in Jesus as a stranger. The resources given will allow the ESL program to continue to be a "city of refuge" for our immigrants, refugees, and visitors.

I am so thankful for the opportunity to serve as the new ESL coordinator.

the hearing impaired with high quality access to the service.

- 9. A new digital outdoor lighted sign has been designed and is currently in the bidding process.
- 10. The Air Conditioning system in the Christian Education Building has failed and is being replaced before the cooling season begins.
- 11. A Consultant Architect, specializing in the restoration of stained glass has been commissioned, has prepared bidding documents and the restoration of the Sanctuary stained glass has been bid. The Committee is in the process of negotiating a contract with the lowest responsible bidder to begin restoration as soon as the weather will accommodate.
- 12. The Committee prepared a Program Statement for Congregational needs for the future and commissioned an Architectural Firm to begin design work on Phase II. Phase II is intended to help us move forward to develop ourselves as a Downtown Church and to serve the needs of a growing younger population.

Projects Planned for 2017 are:

- 1. Completion of the AC system in the Christian Ed Building
- 2. Start of the restoration of the Sanctuary Stained Glass windows.
- 3. Installation of new outdoor lighted sign at the corner of Church and State Streets.

The F150F Committee intends to then go on hold until given direction from the Session on how to proceed with further projects or Phase II.

Pastor's Pen

As the first month of the year passes I am grateful to God for the response of this congregation to the ministry needs of this church. Because many of you have given sacrificially, we are able to welcome **Debra Miller** to our staff as our new ESL director. Debra and her husband **Sean** and their daughter **Miriam** are newer members of our church. We are also now able to pursue a part-time CYF staff person to assist **Mindy** in that ministry as well as hire a part-time technology assistant to work with **Pastor Eric**.

We continue to live into what it means to follow the call of Christ to be salt and light in this world. Reading *Deuteronomy 15* in light of recent political events I was drawn in by the compassion of God as God speaks to the people through Moses. These verses express God's heart for us as leaders and a community of faith:

"Every seventh year you shall grant a remission of debts...There will, however, be no one in need among you, because the Lord is sure to bless ... If there is among you anyone in need, a member of your community in any of your towns within the land that the Lord your God is giving you, do not be hard-hearted or tight-fisted toward your needy neighbor. You should rather open your hand, willingly lending enough to meet the need, whatever it shall be. Be careful that you do not entertain a mean thought...your neighbor might cry to the Lord against you, and you would incur guilt. Give liberally and be ungrudging when you do so, for on this account the Lord your God will bless you in all your work and in all you undertake. Since there will never cease to be someone in need on the earth, I therefore command you, 'Open your hand to the poor and needy neighbor".

The command Jesus gave to "Be perfect as your heavenly Father is perfect" is grounded in the compassion of God. Prior to that command Jesus says, "For if you love those who love you, what reward do you have?" (*Matthew 5:46-48*).

We witness God's compassion for the Alien, the Immigrant, dwelling within Israel. Listen to this verse from *Leviticus* 19:33-4; "When an alien resides with you in your land, you shall not oppress the alien. The alien who resides with you shall be as the citizen among you; you shall love the alien as yourself, for you were aliens in the land of Egypt: I am the Lord your God".

Are not most of our families once immigrants, grateful that this nation took them in? The words of poet and refugee advocate Emma Lazarus imagined the Statue of Liberty saying, "Give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses yearning to breathe free."

The compassion of God, which has influenced the values of this country, is grounded in the Great Commandment directing us to loving God and our neighbor as ourselves. That core commandment which Jesus lifts up lies in the center of God's heart and soul. Centuries before we hear God say, "but you shall love your neighbor as yourself: I am the Lord" (*Leviticus 19:18*).

Thomas Merton captures this truth when he observes that, "The whole of compassion is based on a keen awareness of the interdependence of all these living beings, which are all part of one another and all involved in one another." Created in the image of God, we all share a common humanity. To serve my neighbor's need is to serve my own. Self- interest as the controlling force for living has no place around Christ's Table. Neither does self-interest as a guiding light serve a nation well either.

Paul articulates what the controlling center and interest in our lives is to be: "Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility count others as better than yourselves. Let each of you look not to your own interests, but to the interests of others. Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus..." (*Philippians 2:3-5*).

This is a time for us as Christ's people to live into and reflect the compassion of God. I thank the staff and all of you, the people of FPCC, who continue to demonstrate the compassion of Christ through all you do, day in and day out. Let us all continue to be the salt and light and compassion of Christ.

Sunday School News

We are continuing the theme of God's word to build upon what the children learned last semester. The word has become flesh and is dwelling among us now is our story line. We will be listening closely to the words Jesus had to share with us. We will especially be spending time with the words of Christ that we hear repeated in worship, *The Lord's Prayer* and the Lord's Supper.

Financial Review of 2016

Operating Budget: As presented in Table 1, lower than anticipated revenue in 2016 was mostly, but not entirely, offset by lower expenses. The result is a 2016 deficit of over \$10,000 more than what was budgeted. The shortfall in revenue was primarily due to lower pledged contributions than anticipated.


Investment Portfolio Busey Wealth Management (BWM): The market moved upward in 2016 and this was reflected in a \$76,738 (4.1% after fees) gain in our BWM investment pool. During 2016, contributions of \$916 were received, endowment distributions of \$8,007 were made, and fees of \$14,133 were paid, resulting in a final balance of \$1,945,212 compared to \$1,875,565 at the end of 2015.

Forward 150 (F-150): At the end of 2016, the conclusion of the second year of this campaign, contributions of approximately \$1,815,700 had been received, which is nearly 88% of the total amount expected for 3 years. Expenses in 2016 were \$344,500 and total \$1,109,700 to date. Payments were made for the sprinkler installation, organ upgrades and \$35,700 to missions.

Restricted Contributions: These special contributions and contributions for specified uses are outside the operating budget. Approximately \$69,000 of these contributions were made in 2016. This included \$61,000 for a variety of specific and general missions and \$8,000 in memory of members who passed away.

Property: The amount of \$300,000 is the estimated value of the southwest Champaign property that is presently rented for farming. The value is listed at \$10,000 per acre, but expected to be 3 to 4 times that value for development in the future.

January Contributions: Contributions for 2017 that were prepaid in 2016 were \$92,039 compared to \$136,983 in 2016. Prepaid contributions are prorated over 12 months for these reports. Contributions for January in 2017 were about \$30,000 more than in 2016, both years having 5 Sundays. This is well above the amount projected in the 2017 budget and an excellent start to the year.
