# Pastor's Pen

Ministry is most successful and satisfying when we lead out of our strengths. This is true of us as a church community and as individuals. Paul expresses it this way; "But when God, who had set me apart before I was born and called me through his grace, was pleased to reveal his Son to me, so that I might proclaim him among the Gentiles."

The first thing that we need to get straight is who we are. We belong to God by God's grace given through Christ. He sets us apart, gifts us, and calls us. We learn what we are gifted for through prayer, petition, self-inquiry, and feedback from others. All individuals and churches have a gift mix that God grants so that we know what we are equipped to do. We have to seek it out.

How do we do that? We look at options. A healthy person or congregation knows the value of engagement, the exchange of ideas, and the vitality of interaction. It is important to share ideas, dialogue with one another, and ask questions.

We are a changing congregation. Our Church-Youth-and Family ministry (CYF) is now predominately Congolese. We see fewer Caucasian participants. What is God saying to us? Do we choose to self-select and go where people are more like us or stay and ask how God is challenging us to grow and be a part of what God is doing here? No one can tell another what to do or not to do, but each of us is being asked to prayerfully consider what gifts God would have us focus on and use for the common good. This ministry is messy.

People are expressing to me that this isn't the church I used to know. It is not. Certainly it is not the same church I was called to ten years ago. Like many of you, I find myself grieving the loss but am in the throes of reorienting myself to what and where it is that God is asking us to use our individual and corporate gifts. As what used to give us meaning, attachment, and comfort seems to elude us, it is natural to experience a loss of energy and focus. We have to reinvent ourselves.

#### **Pastor's Pen continued**

During times of loss, people tend to deal with one another and the circumstances in different ways. We need to mourn. I feel that way about the PCUSA and the changes we are experiencing through so many churches leaving the denomination. The danger is to not express our feelings, to become locked in time. If we refuse to let go of yesterday's memories we won't find the present satisfying. We will look for someone, like a new pastor perhaps, to fix it and restore us to what we think we once were. Our feelings may go underground only to reappear at a later time in not so helpful ways. During times of change our relationships may be tested. Patience, love and listening go a long way. We need to stay in the relationship. Regardless of how things might seem and how we may feel, God is present extending grace and guidance.

A mark of a healthy organism is the ability to adapt to changing conditions. To grieve appropriately is to empower. Mourning helps us to adapt to loss and change. It acknowledges the present reality and feelings, dialogues about them, grieves the loss, and begins to move forward into God's new reality.

And the most nourishing attitude that we can embrace is gratitude. Christ's steadfast love and sovereign grace must be front and center in our life together. We need to be generous to one another, supportive and encouraging. Paul sets us in the right direction; "Above all, clothe yourselves with love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony" (Colossians 3:14). So here we go. God is nudging us to look at our present options he is putting before us. Let us take stock of the material and human resources God has given us. Let us seek support, ask questions, affirm the ability God is giving us to move forward and make clear, thoughtful and prayerful decisions. It is Christ's church after all.

#### Zula H. Rose Fund

In previous newsletter articles, I have written in general about our 11 endowment funds, and this month will highlight the **Zula H. Rose Fund**, chosen more or less at random. The fund was established from the estate of **William Cummings Rose**, better known as **Will Rose**, in 1986 as a memorial to his wife. The will stated that the proceeds (from the fund) be used for the landscaping or other beautification of the Church grounds, which may include a part-time yard man or other professional services. It went on to say that It is my hope that the Church yard may become one of the beauty spots of Champaign.

Will Rose grew up in South Carolina and his father was a Presbyterian minister. He came to Champaign in 1922 as a Professor of Physiological Chemistry at the U of I, a title which was later changed to Professor of Biochemistry, and he founded the present Department of Biochemistry at the U of I.


Dr. Rose was a distinguished biochemist who received many awards for his studies on amino acids in nutrition. He discovered the last amino acid, threonine, of the 20 amino acids known to be present in proteins in our bodies. He also determined which amino acids were essential to be in the diet and which were not.


**Dick Arnould** served on the budget committee for our church that was chaired by Will and notes that he had a great mind and was a quiet, but very active member of our church.

Today, due to his generous bequest, the Zula Rose Fund has an endowed principal of \$82,772 + accumulated earnings of about \$10,000, and payouts of about \$5,000 each year are used for landscaping purposes as requested in his will.

**March Contributions:** Contributions for March were about \$5,500 less than in March 2015, but YTD contributions

remain slightly higher than in 2015. YTD contributions are about \$35,000 behind the projected contributions in the 2016 budget.

# Don't they knit baby blankets and roll bandages?

Of course many Presbyterian Women are skilled in the textile arts. We sew dresses out of pillowcases for children in Africa, knit prayer shawls to comfort people who are hurting and crochet soft caps to keep infants' heads warm.

For many years, hospitals around the world requested rolled bandages. So we rolled up our sleeves and, well, rolled thousands of bandages to provide relief to thousands around the world.

But Presbyterian Women's mission work isn't always done from a comfy chair. Sometimes we grab shovels and work boots, using not just our hands, but our arms, legs, backs and of course prayers. For example, our PW Knifty Knitters have formed a partnership with the Luyano Presbyterian Women and they knit together, sharing ideas. This year, they made scarves and gloves for the children at Kemmerer Village. Regardless of the tools and muscles used, Presbyterian Women embody *1 Corinthians 12:4–7's* "varities of gifts . . . varieties of services," directing those to co-creating God's vision of wholeness.

# Champaign First Cuba Partners

The Cuba Partnership is a covenant relationship between our congregation and that of the Presbyterian Reformed Church at Luyanó in Havana, Cuba. Our purpose is to embody our unity in Christ, to be faithful witnesses to Christ in our families, communities, countries and the world, to sensitize our respective church families to critical situations in our societies and to cooperate in those in which the church can make a difference and to explore various areas of joint mission.

Cuba Partners are all the people who have completed a Cuba Study. That's fifty people since the first study was led by **Bill and Pat Metcalf** in 2009. Since that time our congregation has hosted five guests from Cuba as we now prepare to host three more this month.

In the same period we have enjoyed multiple trips to build friendships with our sister church. These have included congregational trips, a youth trip, visits to help with vacation bible school, visits to celebrate important events in the Cuban church and visits to participate in a variety of workshops and conferences.

Our congregation supports **Jo Ella Hol-man**, mission co-worker for Cuba and the Caribbean and the National Center Of The Presbyterian Church (meeting and retreat center) near Santa Clara. Recently through our Raindrop Project we helped update the toilet facilities in our sister church. We are also in partnership through our national Presbyterian Cuba Partners Network and the national Cuba Connection.


For decades the Presbyterian Church – USA has been reaching across the straits of Florida to stand in solidarity with Cuban Presbyterians.

Daniel Izquierdo is pastor at the Luyanó Presbyterian Church in Havana, the General Secretary of the Presbyterian Reformed Church in Cuba, a faculty member and the chair of the Board of Trustees of the Evangelical Theological Seminary in Matanzas, Cuba. He was selected by Cuban Presbyterians to represent them at the PC-USA meeting of the General Assembly in Portland this June.



Nancy Raquel Cardona Fernandez grew up in the Baptist Church and has been a

member of the church at Luyanó since 1980 where she plays the piano, teaches Sunday School and serves as Moderator of Presbyterian Women. In 1999 Raquel completed studies at the Institute of Theological Studies with a specialty in liturgy. She has been a governing elder since 2000.

Raquel has two sons who live in Spain with their familes and two daughters who live in Cuba. The eldest, Karen, has a fifteen year old daughter and a twenty-eight year old son who lives in Washington DC. Raquel lives with her younger daughter who has three sons, one of whom is autistic.

Raquel retired from a career as an accountant with the Ministry of Public Health.



Yamilet Sánchez Camacho is a governing elder having served on session since 2004. She also serves the congregation as Director of Christian Education and teaches Sunday School. Yamilet works as a ceramic artista. She is married and has a thirteen year old daughter. Yamilet enjoys reading, cooking and crocheting.
