PRAYERS FOR BOB AND KRISTI RICE

Bob and Kristi Rice, currently serving in South Sudan, experienced gun violence in their apartment building in mid-October. They are both safe, but one person died in the event. You can read the whole story on their blog, <http://bobandkristi.blogspot.com/>. They ask for your prayers, "We appreciate your prayers as we heal and recover from the trauma, as we seek to not live in fear, and as we seek wisdom for such situations and how we can best be equipped to serve in this needy land. We invite you to pray with us for the family of the young man who died a rather senseless death. Pray for wisdom in how we can show our neighbors love and solidarity."

Providing Temporary Shelter

This fall and winter, more options will be available for those without an address in our community.

Homelessness is a persistent problem across our country. According to the National Alliance to End Homelessness, the 2017 national estimate of homelessness identified 17 out of every 100,000 as experiencing homelessness. Those numbers rose between 2016 and 2017.

Thankfully, most of those individuals were in transitional housing or some other form of temporary shelter. However, approximately 34 percent lived in a place not meant for human habitation, such as a street or an abandoned building.

Locally, we have community stakeholders working diligently to provide shelter and programming to help lift people out of homelessness. Courage Connection and Canteen Run are two agencies we support who address homelessness in some way. Courage Connection provides shelter for families who have experienced domestic violence and are homeless. Canteen Run provides food, clothing, prayer, and toiletries to those without a home.

In the wake of the unexpected closing of the TIMES Center, we stepped forward to provide space when asked to do so by a new men's emergency

shelter run primarily by leadership at Faith United Methodist Church. This group is now set to run a shelter back in the old TIMES Center building! They will be hosting men from November 12 to April 15.

If you or your group would like to help, consider the following ways. First, you can help by providing snack or breakfast food items for one week during the season. Second, you can help set up sleeping areas and clean the shelter space on Fridays from 4:30 pm to 6:30 pm. If you can volunteer in one of those ways, please contact Rev. Cory Blackwell at 359-3631 or cory@champaignfaith.org. It costs about \$400 per day to operate the shelter to house up to 50 people; this is a very cost effective sum! But, what about women? Austin's Place is opening up for their 12th season of serving women in our community! The hope is to be open from December 1 to March 31. This year, they have increased the capacity for sleeping from 8 to 10. This is exciting

news! Courage Connection provides screening and checking in with professionals before women are transported to the shelter across the street from us: Austin's Place is located at First United Methodist Church of Champaign. Austin's Place is in need of volunteer drivers and overnight volunteers. Volunteering is easy and fun. Austin's Place Trainings/informational sessions are being hosted **Thursday, November 8th at 7pm, Monday, November 26th at 7pm and Saturday, December 1 at 10am.**
