So, stay tuned. Check your bulletin for details and get on board. We'd love to see you at one of the sessions or hear from you with suggestions for something you'd like to study.



Guns In Society

WESLEY ANNUAL SEMINAR

Americans are 25 times more likely do die from guns than people living in similar western countries. Guns account for 51% of suicides. Over 4.6 million American children live in homes with loaded and unlocked guns. Gun deaths continue to increase.

A panel of experts will lead discussion of our gun violence epidemic. Included are Andrew Leipold, Professor of Law on "How Much Does the Second Amendment Matter?"; Tracy Parsons, Community Relations Manager on "Addressing Our Community Gun Violence Issues Together"; Ruby Mendenhall, Associate Professor of law on "Parenting in the Midst of Violence and Fear". They join other distinguished leaders from the medical and scientific community as well as gun violence victims to address the issue.

Presbyterian Legends

ELIJAH LOVEJOY 1802-1837

David used a sling shot. Rahab changed history with a crimson rope. For Elijah Parish Lovejoy it was a printing press.

Lovejoy was a Presbyterian Pastor. He was murdered at the age of 35 in Alton, IL. Educated at Princeton Seminary, he was a husband, a father of two and the publisher of the Alton Observer. The Observer was a religious newspaper which preached the Bible and the abolition of slavery.

His printing presses were repeatedly destroyed but Lovejoy refused to be silenced. He believed free speech to be a constitutional right. Ultimately he and his followers were attacked by an angry, armed, drunken mob. Lovejoy was shot five times. The shooters were acquitted of the crime.

A national outrage ensued martyring Lovejoy and bolstering national sentiments for abolition.

Abraham Lincoln was a representative in the Illinois general assembly at the time of Lovejoy's death. Some believe that Elijah Lovejoy's life influenced Lincoln's thinking on announcing the Emancipation Proclamation. Paul Simon, Illinois journalist, politician and author writes that "Lovejoy's fight was a struggle to make his faith something more than a repetition of words.... well placed bricks and stained glass windows and comforting sermons meant not to disturb."

Simon ends his biography citing examples of people who have taken unpopular positions to promote the common good. His last words are these: "There is no scarcity of people who are oppressed. There is only a scarcity of men and women with eyes clear enough to see and hearts big enough to act."


Transportation Team Needs Drivers!

Canaan Safe House and Jesus Is the

Way: Thank You for your support of these two mission agencies who had their fundraisers in August!!! First Presbyterian Church members were seen enjoying the Safe House Jazz Concert at Hessel Park Sunday. It was a large family friendly crowd that enjoyed food, fellowship and music. And, First Presbyterian Church sponsored a banquet table at Jesus is the Way. Both of these agencies support substance abuse recovery in our community. We are grateful for their work!

Courage Connection...Carol Arnould and Rachel Matthews visited Courage Connection recently and met Osajuli Cravens, Outreach and Volunteer Specialist.

Here are Carol's notes:

The Courage Connection uses some volunteers, who must all go through their training and security checks. Confidentiality is of high importance. The volunteers help the clients get involved in jobs, counsel clients, teach how to fill out job applications and use computers. These are just a few of the skill needs. Volunteers also can answer calls, supervise children and tutor for school work. The clients have many needs when they arrive or leave such as toiletries, over the counter medicines for adults and children. These are only a few.

Immediate needs at the Courage Connection are:

• Underwear (male and female adults

- and children)
- Socks for all ages
- Towels,
- Wash cloths
- Twin sheets and pillow cases
- Gift cards
- Baby Wipes and disposable diapers

An easy way to buy these would be to go to courageconnection.org/wish-list to have any of these items delivered directly to their office.

Courage Connection provides a temporary home for the abused women and children and a few men and boys for shelter. The clients receive help to get involved in the community by getting jobs and developing other capabilities. They are free to come and go. They are responsible for their own meals. Courage Connection is in a time of transition and working on a brochure to explain what they are doing. Rachel and I highly recommend our church to give continuous support. This is a very definite need in our community.

R.U.M. has been "giving hope to the hopeless in Champaign County, Illinois for nearly 25 years," says their Facebook page.

"Since 1993, Restoration's programs – a hotel-turned-residence, a food and clothing pantry, counseling and classes,

and ministry – have been turning countless lives around, putting single parents, families, and couples back on track and embracing Jesus."

"Restoration welcomes individuals of all backgrounds and stations in life. Once in the program, Restoration provides temporary support to residents while providing them with educational, spiritual, and emotional opportunities for growth. Our work is helping to lead people to independent and self-sufficient lives through the love of Jesus Christ."

Salt and Light...You may have read in the paper or seen on the WCIA Morning Show that Salt and Light is trying to raise \$450,000 before the end of the year. We have the full press release on our mission kiosk in Westminster Hall. FPCC is in active conversation with Salt and Light through your community mission deacons. Linda Tauber-Olson, Mike Havey and Rachel Matthews have visited with Nathan Montgomery and Lisa Sheltra to see how First Presbyterian Church can help. Many of our local mission agencies as well as First Presbyterian Church Champaign utilize Salt and Light for job skill training as well as groceries. Anybody can shop at Salt and Light to raise credits for people who need assistance. We have included the August 13 press release for those who might not have read it. Press Release...

Salt and Light needs help from the community to raise at least \$450k by the end of the year. In November 2017, when we launched our Urbana location, we were seizing a tremendous opportunity to bring our unique programming to an area of our community desperately in need of it. After spending time evaluating the potential of such an expansion, then developing a plan for moving forward, we took this leap. Since the launch of our Urbana location our impact has grown significantly: The number of households participating in our programming has grown from just under 200 households per month to over 350.

Since January 2018, our participants have earned and spent almost \$420,000 in store credit on groceries, clothing, and household items.

We have been able to enter into more than 20 new community partnerships, providing GED classes, children's story times and music lessons, voter registration, mobile medical services, and much more. Our ability to undertake this kind of expansion rested on the belief we would be able to offset the expenses of the project with contributions as part of a capital campaign, and that revenue from the community shopping in our grocery and thrift stores would offset the increase in operating costs. Though we have seen an increase in support from the community, neither of these has happened to the degree we needed them to.

Over the past year and a half, we have cut every non-operationally critical expense to bridge the gap between our hoped-for and our actual contributions and retail revenues. Currently, 80% of our budget is met through people shopping in our stores and revenue from recycling unusable items, with another 16% met by donations from

individuals, churches, and businesses. Clearly, we have realized levels of selfsustainability unheard of for nonprofits, but still have another 4% we need to make up through

increased sales and ongoing giving. Even though we now find ourselves in a much more sustainable position, the unresolved shortfalls of the past year and a half have made our current financial situation unsustainable, and have forced us into a fight just to keep our doors open. To ensure we can continue working with those who are vulnerable and in poverty in our community we need to raise at least \$450K by the end of the year.

The "Story Garden's" Story

In partnership with Faith in Place and the Park Districts of Urbana and Champaign , First Church and the Green Team, joined nine other churches in the community to develop Story Gardens. Each garden was to have common elements such as four "anchor" plants and a sign with "Our Story Garden." The gardens would provide a common thread throughout the C/U faith community. In addition, each Story Garden will contain unique plants and elements that told their own church's story. Planning, creating, and maintaining the garden was the goal for 2016.

The participating churches all had plants that created the common thread that included:

- * Swamp Milkweed
- * Butterfly Milkweed
- * Purple Coneflowers
- * A native Illinois grass such as Prairie Dropseed, Little Bluestem or Switch grass

Each garden was to have a sign designating it a "Story Garden" and all signs would be designed to look alike. At the same time, the gardens would have elements that told the congregation's personal and unique story.

First Presbyterian Church chose ancient



plants referred to in the Bible and found around the world to represent our multicultural congregation, the age of our church and our global mission. Placed in three different pots, the plants include lavender, mint and dill weed and are attractive to pollinators.

To represent the diversity of our congregation, mixed Zinnias planted from seed were used as a backdrop. Finally, a bird bath was added to provide water for insects and birds, God's smallest creatures.

Our current Story Garden includes the three "ancient" plants in the pots (lavender, mint and dill), butterfly milkweed, purple cone flowers and prairie dropseed grasses. The Story Garden sign is mounted on a cross, reflecting our Christian faith and the three pots represent the Trinity, the foundation of our church.

butterfly milkweed didn't come back this year.) Because rabbits feast on the young zinnia plants, we didn't include them in this bed, but they are in our Pollinator Pocket on the south side of the church building.

Financial Update




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
Contributions in August were \$1K less than in 2018 and \$9K below the budget at \$67K. The Year to Date total is above last year by \$38K but below the budgeted amount by \$20K. These figures include prepaid pledges (those paid in the year prior to the budget year) that are prorated over the year with 1/12 added to each month's contributions. Including all revenue sources, at 66.7% through the year, we have received 66.8% of the expected 2019 revenue.

Expenses

Year to Date expenses are \$23K below the budget at \$685K but \$2K above 2018. Considering all sources, revenue exceeds expenses by \$3K which is \$14K better than at the end of August in 2018. This figure includes \$32K less in prepaid pledges than in 2018. At 66.7% through the year we have experienced 64.6% of the expected 2019 expenses.







DREAAM Shares Their Enthusiasm at the Big Tent Workshop This Summer

Fifty-two young people, staff and parents from Champaign, IL, traveled to Baltimore to be a part of the Big Tent workshop *Loving our Neighbors: Reviving our Witness to Young People by Supporting our Public Schools.*

The individuals were there to represent the organization Driven to Reach Excellence & Academic Achievement for Males (DREAAM). DREAAM is a partner of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)'s Educate a Child Initiative launched at the 2016 General Assembly.

The session began with a presentation from the DREAAM students. Children gathered into their "huddle" to perform a highly energized good morning chant followed by their welcome chant and their tribe chant. The chants are daily rituals practiced by the student participants to build positive affirmations and collective responsibility and to get them excited about their day.

The students also recite five exhortations each day. They say dreamers are: respectful, leaders, work hard, use appropriate words and are positive brothers. Additionally, they say a prayer to remember the children separated from their parents at the border.

Tracy Dace, founder and executive director of DREAAM, is a member of First Presbyterian Church of Champaign. He has worked in nonprofit organizations and served as an adjunct professor at Parkland Community College.

"God gave me a vision to address the plight of African American boys," said Dace. "First Presbyterian heard my vision in 2015 and decided to support the vision." Dace says the church has stood beside him and the program since the beginning.

"Churches have opened their doors and given us space to meet. First Pres has allowed us to use their van and supplied volunteers. But what is really exciting is to see the relationships established between the kids and the volunteers," he said.

The DREAAM program adopts an early intervention model. They began working with children at age five and they remain in the program until age 24. "We use evidence-based practices from research to build the program components, but we also include the culture aspect related to our children," he said. Dace says they also consider how trauma may play a role in the students' lives.

DREAAM works to deter the schoolto-prison pipeline. "We work to create a school to college pipeline, said Dace. The program is a year-round program that meets with participants at least five times a week.

Why black boys? Statistics say:
— Slightly under half of black male high school students graduate on time.
— Black men make up 4.3% of those enrolled in colleges and universities.

There are five key components to the DREAAM program. They include:

— Jumpstart to school. The program has a primary focus on kindergarten readiness and helps prevent summer learning loss. The program also helps develop soft skills like conflict resolution and communications.

— Dream Big! is the youth development part of the program.

- Youth Excel is for students 16-24.
- Motivating more males is all about mentoring the students.

— Parent Learning Community provides parent strengthening.

At the conclusion of the workshop Dace provided concrete ways Presbyterian churches can support the efforts to get involved with educating and improving the education attainment for all children. Dace's recommendations include such activities as:

— Direct service: Fill backpack with school supplies at the beginning of the year and provide extras for new students who move in during the school year.

— Consciousness-raising: Attend school board meetings to learn more about policies with the school system.

— Systemic change: Write letters to the editor presenting informed and rational arguments for affordable, accessible and quality public education.

— Christian practices: At least quarterly, incorporate children into your congregation's worship in ways other than the children's sermon.
