the room and collapsed on the floor in a crumpled, soggy heap. It reminded me of myself last week when I wanted pizza for supper and Joan made me eat spinach and asparagus instead.

We've been thinking about the traits and characteristics of grown-up people. We defined a grown-up as someone who is consciously aware of their feelings and takes responsibility for their decisions and actions. Let's add to our list by saying grown-up people exhibit control of their emotions. They are able to govern their responses, acting thoughtfully and appropriately even in, perhaps especially in, moments of resentment and anger.

I've been thinking about anger this week. Some weeks I think about joy and beauty and goodness, but this week I've been thinking about anger. When I was young, I was taught that anger was wrong, that it was destructive, and the ruination of many a good person. I was taught to be calm, to quickly forgive, to never bear a grudge. This was easy to do, because nothing grievously wrong had ever been done to me. I was a white male in a culture that prized both whites and males. I came from a middle class family in a culture that valued the middle class. I was Christian in a nation often referred to as a Christian nation. So when I was advised by my parents and my pastors and my teachers not to be angry, it was easy to take their advice, since I had nothing to be angry about. And because life was wonderful and fair and blessed for me, I assumed it was that way for everyone. I wondered how anyone could be angry, and when I would meet an angry person, I would think to myself, "What do they have to be angry about?"

I was down at the farm this past Wednesday evening and drove through the country to a little town for supper. The town has a population of 728, all of them white according to the United States Census Bureau. Not one black, not one Hispanic, not one Asian. Five townsmen were seated in the bar complaining

about black people, blaming their problems on the Black Lives Matter movement. I wondered if they even know any black people. I almost asked them that, but since there were five of them and only one of me, I decided to practice Quaker silence. But the young waiter, who looked like he'd been baling hay all summer, was having none of it. The more they talked, the angrier he became. Finally, he said, "I don't want to hear that nonsense. Knock it off or leave." Much to my surprise, they knocked it off and changed the subject. Both the men and the waiter were angry, but the men used their anger for ill, and the waiter used his anger for good.

Lyman Abbott, the pastor of the Congregational Church in Terre Haute during the Civil War, once said, "Do not teach your children never to be angry; teach them how to be angry." A good measure of our morality is what makes us angry. If we're angry because our sense of privilege and entitlement has been violated, that's a good indication our anger is inappropriate, harmful, and even hateful. But if we're angry because someone at the bottom of the ladder has been kicked down even lower, that means we still have a conscience, that our sense of morality has not been corrupted and corroded by privilege. Indeed, sometimes being angry is the holiest emotion we can have.

Grown-up people know how to be angry. They know which situations and circumstances merit their anger, and which do not. They use anger to further the cause of justice. Jesus did this. When the moneychangers had taken over the one area of the Temple reserved for Gentiles, the one court set aside for the outsiders, he took whip in hand and drove them out. That is anger in the cause of justice. When people gather in cities and towns across America to decry the abuse of Black people, that is anger in the cause of justice. When a black man is assaulted at Lake Monroe and the county prosecutor receives over 30,000 emails and 10,000 phone calls demanding action, that is anger in the cause of justice.

Do not teach your children never to be angry. Teach them how to be angry.

When Joan and I married, her mother told us never to go to bed mad. Maybe someone gave you that advice too. But I like Phyllis Diller's advice, who said, "Never go to bed mad. Stay up and fight."

When the sun of justice has set and the day has darkened and we are weary, we nevertheless need to stay up and fight.

Do you remember the car commercial with the line Zoom, Zoom, Zoom? That word has a different understanding for many of these days. Zoom, Zoom, Zoom - many of us spend much of our time on Zoom lately. In the month of July, our church hosted 77 Zoom meetings, with a total of 578 participants in those meetings, for a total of 33,492 minutes of meeting time for participants! And those numbers don't include ESL classes, which are also meeting online. We are adapting to this medium, and I am grateful for all those continuing the ministries of God through this congregation in this new way! Many thanks to Lizz Pippin for all of her help in organizing Zoom meetings in the last few months. With her departure, Marcia Franks will be taking on primary responsibility for scheduling Zoom meetings for our congregation. If you need a Zoom meeting set up for your committee or group, please email zoom@firstpres. church and Marcia will help get you going. (Using this address for Zoom will help us to organize our Zoom requests, and for me to jump in to help when Marcia

is unavailable.) If you need the link to an existing Zoom meeting, please use that same address (zoom@firstpres.church). Our church calendar has not been quite consistent with actual meetings lately, but Marcia is working to resolve that, so check firstpres.church/calendar for the schedule of meetings. Please note that we do not post Zoom links on our website to help keep our meetings secure.

Often, our Zoom meetings are operating without what Zoom calls a "host." The host has special abilities to mute participants, control screen sharing, remove someone from the meeting (if necessary), and a few other miscellaneous tasks. We are shifting to a new strategy regarding hosts for meetings. If you are the organizer of the meeting, you or someone you delegate can have access to the host controls on an ongoing basis. If you wish to have such access, please email zoom@ firstpres.church and we'll get you set up.

Please make sure you are clicking on the correct link for the meeting scheduled at the time. Meeting links will look very similar, but clicking on the wrong link can interfere with other meetings. The meeting name will be displayed when you connect, so if the meeting name isn't correct, check to make sure you have the correct link. If you have any questions about the link, email zoom@firstpres.church.

Thanks so much for learning something new! If you haven't jumped in to a Zoom meeting yet, give it a try. It's pretty easy – after installing the app, you just click a link sent to you for the meeting, and you're in. Let us know if you need assistance! I look forward to seeing you on Zoom!

Financial Update

Contributions


Contributions in July to the Operating Fund were \$16.3K more than in 2019 but \$0.5K below the budget at \$77.0K. The Year to Date total is above last year by \$0.8K but below the budgeted amount by \$18.0K. These figures include prepaid pledges (those paid in the year prior to the budget year) that are prorated over the year with 1/12 added to each month's contributions. Including all revenue sources, at 58.3% through the year, we have received 64.0% of the expected 2020 revenue.


Expenses

Year to Date expenses are \$16.7K below the budget at \$608.8K but more than in 2019 by \$13.7K. At 58.3% through the year we have experienced 56.8% of the expected 2020 expenses.


Balance

Considering all sources, revenue exceeds expenses by \$185.8K which is \$151.8K better than at the end of July in 2019. This figure includes \$61.9K more in prepaid pledges than in 2019 and \$134.2K from the Federal Paycheck Protection Program established by the Federal CARES Act.



Teaching ESL During a Pandemic

Just like much of what happened with the church, Champaign-Urbana, the US and the world, the First Pres ESL Program discontinued in-person classes in March 2020. We quickly transitioned to online instruction via Zoom to meet the needs of our students.

Such a drastic and abrupt transition meant that it was an adjustment for the tutors and students. Nevertheless, once the summer session began, it seemed like we had found our bearings with using Zoom to teach. Summer session was from June 15th to July 30th. During this time, we had 10 tutors, myself included, and about 40 students registered for summer class. In contrast, in our face-to-face lessons during the summer when we are not in a pandemic, we would normally only have about 15 students who come to class each day. Our class attendance has actually increased online in the pandemic.

One benefit of teaching online is that we have been able to be more flexible with when we offer class, which allows us to schedule class at times when the students are free. Each student is registered for at least 2 classes each week, and we have been able to add a few new students to our online program. Another benefit is that our classes are smaller. Each tutor has anywhere from 2-6 students attending their classes, so they get more attention and specialized instruction.

Online Registration for Class

Currently, our online classes are full, but prospective students can attend a virtual ESL Information Meeting where they can learn more about the program, ask questions, sign-up on the waiting list, and complete a short interview with Jeanette. They will need to attend one of the online ESL Information Meetings through Zoom on the following days:

- Saturday, August 8th at 9 AM
- Saturday, August 22nd at 9 AM

In order to attend the ESL Information Meeting, students will need to download Zoom and send Jeanette Pyne, the ESL Coordinator, an email to receive the link, meeting ID, and password for the meeting. Jeanette's email is jeanette@firstpres. church. They must email Jeanette for this information to get into the meeting.

Thursday, July 23, we met to catch up on current happenings in Cuba and specifically ways to support the brothers and sisters of Luyanó.

Our newest items about Cuba were learning that the government sees the COVID crisis, coupled with more stringent sanctions from the USA and further limiting of remittances to Cuba, to be as devastating to the island as the loss from the economic pullout of the USSR in the 1990's. The Cubans, especially those in urban areas, encounter shortages of basic food stuffs and other supplies. Additionally, the government is allowing the opening of "Dollar Stores". This isn't our favorites Dollar Tree or Dollar General! No! These stores permit purchases in U.S. dollars as

currency. This is a very big change. Also, restaurants can now accept government food cards.

The Covid-19 pandemic appears to be under control on the island at this time. However, the Presbyterian Church in Cuba (IPRC) has requested we refrain from travel to our sister congregations until October at the earliest. Any plans would be contingent on conditions in the sending and receiving countries.

Our First Pres Cuba Partner's trip planned for the spring was cancelled due to the pandemic. We do not plan to travel until spring 2021 at the earliest. Cancelled

travel plans mean that funds and supplies, such as water filters, that we and other Cuba Partner groups typically bring along as part of our travel were not distributed. While unable to get supplies to our sister churches, an opportunity opened up for the PCUSA Cuba Partners Network (PCUSA-CPN) to collect funds and send them to the IPRC in June. These are being used where the IPRC determines they are most urgently needed. Many of our First Pres Cuba Partners contributed to that fund and First Pres office staff quickly processed the contributions. The IPRC, PCUSA-CPN and the First Pres Steering Committee send their thanks to all who helped make that possible.

Based the success of the June effort, the PCUSA-CPN is organizing another effort to send funds. This time there will be the opportunity to designate funds to the sister churches or projects in Cuba. If you would like more information, please contact the Steering Committee.

Specifically, we would ask you to pray for the church in Luyanó, access to the supply chain to Cuba of basic needs (powdered milk, oil and meat). Pray for materials to maintain pure water systems.

In all things we see how God provides a way to see hope and His hand as we trust and do His Will!
